Kristen Antoon, CVT, VTS (Cardiology)

Ms. Antoon is a certified veterinary technician and a Veterinary Technician Specialist (VTS) in cardiology at the Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine at Tufts University. She began working as a veterinary technician in 2001 and subsequently obtained her veterinary technician certification in 2005. In 2007, she joined the intensive care unit of the Foster Hospital for Small Animals at the Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine. She has regularly participated in the annual Tufts Technician Symposium since 2010. She has presented case reports at ACVIM and VECCS. The case report presented at VECCS was published in the Veterinary Technician Magazine in 2011. In 2012, she joined the cardiology service. Since joining the cardiology team, she has been involved with several industry-lead and academic clinical trial studies, along with being a co-author on a couple of these clinical trial studies. In 2016, she became the 20th VTS in cardiology. She was co-presenter at ACVIM in 2017 on 'Introduction to Cardiac Catheters and Implants, Techniques for Cardiac and Non-cardiac Procedures'. She has also been involved with giving CE for 'Techs by Techs' at Tufts.
